Dental Care Accommodations

Unity Point Health-Meriter, UW Health, and SSM Health have partnered to provide hospital setting dental healthcare services for adults with Medicaid/Medicare that need accommodations to safely receive care in a typical dental setting, typically those with disabilities.

WDA does not have a formal mediation, case review or peer review program, and we do not review patient files. Additionally, the WDA does not have the authority to order a dentist or dental office to take any specific action. What we will do is contact the dentist on your behalf, share details of your complaint and ask them to work with you to resolve the matter. The WDA is unable to accept anonymous complaints, complaints where the dentist is not specifically named or complaints about fees, insurance or billing.

Wisconsin Donated Dental Services (DDS) Carrie Golabowski 1-866-812-9840 cgolabowski@wda.org	This program helps bring needed dental care to Wisconsin residents who are unable to afford treatment because of a limited income (cannot have MA or other dental coverage) that is due to a permanent disability or advanced age (65 and older). The care is intended to meet a given need, not provide ongoing care. Services could include dentures, partials, crowns, etc. Applicants are placed on waitlist to be matched with a Dentist in WI that will donate their time and services. 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Tips on finding affordable dental services if you are uninsured/paying out-of-pocket:

- Call dental offices and inquire about in-house financing plans, some dental offices have specific options for those who are uninsured.
- Medical credit cards and third-party payment plans are available at different dental offices throughout the county.
- Donated Dental Services Program may be able to support you if can't afford dental care, based on income limits. The lack of income must be because of a permanent disability, long-term (chronic) illness, or old age (65 or older). https://www.wda.org/wda-foundation/programs#ow

Questions to Ask for Accommodations

It's important that all adults receive annual dental check-ups and teeth cleaning. However, we know that the dentist's office can be a particularly challenging environment for many adults with disabilities. Further, we know that finding a dental office that provides accommodations for you or your loved one can be difficult. Here are a few potential ways to communicate about common accommodations for the aging and disability community. Below is not an exhaustive list, but rather a starting point for communicating with your dental provider.

Physical Access

Are there accessible routes to and within your clinic? For example, do you have automatic door? Accessible parking? Accessible entryway? Accommodations for wheelchairs? Clear walkways?

Some individuals experience what is known as hypersensitivity to bright light, loud noises, or unique smells. Because of this, some people find it helpful to visit their dentist "after hours" when there is less outside noise and the lights can be turned down? Is this something your office would have the capacity to offer?

Communication Access

Do you or your staff have experience providing care to individuals who communicate non-verbally? For example, using assistive appointments? Written notes? Family/Friend/Caregiver accompanying patient?

For many individuals with disabilities, it is helpful to have extended appointment times, do you have the capacity to offer this type of accommodation? If so, how long can you extend appointments?

Mental/Emotional Access

What kind of training do you or your staff receive in terms of providing care to individuals with physical or cognitive disabilities? Did this training discuss the unique needs of adults? For example, Nitrous oxide aka laughing gas, or oral sedation to help with stressed/anxious patients? Quiet space to help prevent overstimulation?
